COLTS KNOCK OVER UNDEFEATED THAMES

Pirongia Colts played some excellent rugby to knock over previously undefeated Thames United 39-12.

Pirongia began the game strongly and were quickly on the attack in the Thames 22m. Thames was able to keep their try line intact until the 10th minute when Charlie Mason broke off the back of a scrum 7m out and bullied his way over with the conversion from Mitch Zeuren giving Pirongia a well deserved 7-0 lead.

Thames were able to break free from Pirongia's attack and break down field, however a great covering tackle from Flynn Wuest saw the Thames winger bundled into touch 5m short of the line – but from this the ref left the crowd dumb founded when he awarded a penalty try and gave Wuest a 10 minute break in the sin bin.

Pirongia's defence held strong and they kept Thames scoreless over this period with some great defence in the backs from Zeuren, Kirwyn Ellis, Jason Hill and Hayden Beare snuffing out attacks on the fringes. In the 32nd minute Pirongia were still under attack in their 22m when Hill latched onto an intercept and raced 75m to score under the posts with the conversion from Zeuren giving Pirongia a 14-7 half time lead.

After half time Pirongia were back on the attack and after some nice back play Finn McLean was able to draw the last defender and put Lochie Bolstad in for his 1st try in 4 years opening the lead to 19-7. However Thames then exerted some pressure and from the sharp stepping backs were able to create a try to get themselves back in the game1 9-12.

From here Pirongia were able to turn the screws. With Boston Zeuren and Sam Fitness having storming games and leading the forwards on rampages up the field, Thames were soon under pressure from which Zeuren slotted a penalty to open a 22-12 scoreline. Pirongia steamed back on attack, and more



good team play saw Corbin Fleming cross for a try (having been denied once by an unfriendly Thames touch judge) with the conversion from Zeuren extending the lead to 29-12. More attack and another penalty opened up a 32-12 scoreline. More constructive play from Pirongia saw them again breach the Thames defence after a number of phases with Jay Seebeck crashing over for a try which Zeuren converted for a 39-12 scoreline.

This is how the score stayed until the end despite Pirongia's efforts to cross for more points.

Sam Fitness had the game of his career on his 21st birthday, Boston Zeuren was unstoppable with ball in hand, Nathan Stewart and Tama Merrilees were strong on the tackle and with ball in hand, Michael Sanders once again tackled himself to a standstill, Captain Seebeck was a menace with ball in hand and at the breakdown, Vice Captain Mason was back to his storming best with ball in hand, Ellis guided the team well on attacked, Mitch Zeuren was defensive menace in midfield as was Bolstad, and Hill had one of his best defensive efforts in the Black an White stripes, from fullback.



A'S STEAM ROLL FRANKTON

Pirongia Runs Riot in the Second Half After an indifferent first half, Pirongia ran riot against a tiring Frankton team, running away with a comfortable 76-5 win.

Pirongia was always in control of this game, but they just couldn't put things together in the first 20 minutes. After a disallowed try in the first five minutes for a forward pass, Pirongia, through their own mistakes, couldn't put any points on the board. After 20 minutes, the score remained nil all. Pirongia took the lead when Matthew Findsen drove over from a lineout maul in the 34th minute.



Pirongia scored again when, from a lineout near the line, a maul was formed, and when this came to a stop, the ball was spun to Sani Ramuwai who went over. With the successful conversion from Sam Denize, Pirongia held a 12-0 lead. Two minutes later, Inoke Dauniseka took an inside pass from Daniel Belk and ran untouched to score near the post, increasing the lead to 19-0.

Unfortunately for Pirongia, a mistake from the kickoff allowed Frankton to attack the line, and they were able to score in the corner. Going into the break, Pirongia held a comfortable 19-5 lead but were nowhere near their best After some stern words from the coaches, Pirongia came out firing and scored from the kickoff. Daniel Belk made a storming run through the Frankton team. He then put in a well-judged kick that Sam Denize regathered and scored. Denize then successfully kicked the conversion to increase the lead to 26-5.

From this point, Pirongia was able to run in tries at will. Greg Gane scored the next try when he was given the ball 35 metres out, and he was able to use his blistering pace to outrun the cover defence and score in the corner. After some good forwards' work, Ben Rush was next to score when, from a maul five metres out from the line, he spotted a gap and strolled through untouched. With the conversion, Pirongia now held a commanding 38-5 lead. The next try was a great individual effort from Cayden Easterbrook. From a kick, Easterbrook took the ball and broke free from his own 10-metre line and was able to outrun the Frankton defence and score under the posts.



From the 67th minute through to the end of the game, Pirongia was able to score 4 more tries.

Graham Wade scored after he was put into a gap and he ran 50 metres to score in the corner. Thomas



B'S RUE MISSED OPPORTUNITIES

In a scrappy encounter, Pirongia B's were unable to finish off a fired-up Frankton B's team and eventually went down 29 points to 22.

Pirongia started the better and were rewarded with a well-taken individual try by Max Frandi, who was able to gather the ball from the Frankton halfback, break through 2 to 3 tackles, and score under the posts. With the successful conversion from Todd Foster, Pirongia held an early 7-point lead.

Pirongia was having the better of the game, but through dropped balls or not retaining possession in collisions, they handed back possession and territory to the Frankton team. From one such mistake, Frankton were rewarded with a scrum. The ball was spun to their large centre who barged his way over. Frankton then took the lead with a well-taken try. After some interplay, they were able to exploit an overlap and score out wide to take a 12 to 7 lead.

Pirongia then had a good patch on attack and were rewarded with a try to Tim Bird who used his strength from a quick tap to take the ball up strongly, beating two defenders on his way to scoring. Pirongia was finding it difficult to stick to their pattern, but they still looked the better of the two teams, which showed on the scoreboard with another try, this time to the newly returned Andrew Charleston who made an immediate impact, breaking tackles at will and



making huge ground for the Pirongia team. From another penalty 35 metres out from the Frankton line, Charleston took a quick tap and used his pace to outrun Frankton's cover defence and score in the corner. When the halftime whistle sounded, Pirongia held a well-deserved 17 to 12 lead.

The second half became a scrappy affair with Pirongia getting quite frustrated by the continued offside and other offences going unnoticed, which led to Pirongia not being able to get into the flow of the game. Pirongia were able to increase their lead with another well-taken try by Andrew Charleston, who from 5 metres out picked up the ball and was able to reach out and score to increase their lead to 22 to 12. Pirongia camped inside Frankton's half for the next 10 minutes, but they just couldn't finish off a number of opportunities and with 15 minutes to go, Frankton spun the ball wide and found their quick winger who was able to score and close the gap to 22 points to 17.

Frankton were full of confidence now, and keeping the ball in hand, they were running the Pirongia team around, and over the next 10 minutes, they were able to score 2 more tries, converting one to close the game out with a 29 points to 22 win.

Pirongia would rue the number of unforced errors they made, especially in the first half, as well as deviating from their game plan and becoming a bit disjointed. They would be very pleased with the commitment of the team, the great numbers turning out at both trainings and game time, and the youth coming through.

Sean Carter ran hard with the ball all day, making some great ground, Andrew Charleston showed his class when introduced midway through the first half, and Tim Bird organised the backs well and ran well with the ball in hand. Player of the day went to Hunter Scott who was constantly on the ball, ran hard with the ball in hand, and made numerous tackles.
